Information is important but timing is everything. Sometimes you can feel overwhelmed and any information is too much information. This booklet is an attempt to provide you with good information that you can access when you need it. It will hopefully answer questions you may have about where to get help for your child. You can also contact the Children's Community Network for information about services for children (see listing in directory).

I have prepared a similar booklet for parents who have a teen with a physical disability. It's called "Transition: The Journey Towards Adult Services" and provides information on services to help families prepare for the change to adult services.

A special thanks to Kate Barber for her help in editing the directory, the agencies that assisted in its development and also to the parents who inspired it.

The Child and Family Center provides **therapeutic** services to children and families who are faced with social, emotional, or behavioral struggles they cannot resolve themselves **residing with the Districts of Sudbury and Manitoulin.**

Services are offered in English, French, Native cultural context and other languages are provided with the support of interpreters. Our counseling staff work directly with children and families, encouraging their active participation in making decisions about the services they will receive. To access all Child and Family Center programs, **except Supervised Access**, please contact the Children's Community Network at 566-3416. There is no cost for the program as programs are funded by the Ministry of Children and Youth Services.

Family Intervention

Child and Family Intervention is the core mental health treatment program, comprising assessment, treatment planning and implementation, termination and follow-up, within a multidisciplinary and case management approach. Treatment may include therapy for the child/adolescent and their family, social skills group therapy.

Children's Mobile Crisis Program

The Children's Mobile Crisis Program offers a 24hrs / 7 days a week telephone crises intervention service and a bilingual 12 hours / 7 days a week face to face crisis intervention service. For emergency crisis situations, clients are directed to St. Joseph's Health Centre without delay. For clients outside Greater Sudbury, a call to the toll free or local number will put the client in the care of their nearest counsellor. This program is also accessible at sites serving children and youth where clients will be matched with a counsellor upon request. A child or youth in crisis can call or go to Sudbury Regional Hospital Crisis Intervention Program at St. Joseph's Health Centre, 700 Paris Street, Sudbury. To speak directly with a professional. A risk assessment will be completed,

support will be provided, and the person will be directed to appropriate resources.

Day Treatment

The Day Treatment Program, jointly established with the local Boards of Education, provides clinical intervention in the classroom to serve students with social, emotional or behavioural difficulties.

Developmental Clinical and Community Support Services

Provides psychological assessments and clinical supports and services for children/youth with suspected or diagnosed Global Developmental Disability (GDD). These services include diagnostics, clinical assessments, consultations and interventions to meet behavioural/mental health needs as required.

Early Years Mental Health 0-6

Early Years Mental Health addresses mental health problems with children, from birth to six years of age, and their families with intensive, flexible mental health treatment services in their homes, schools and communities. Individual child therapy, family based or group based treatment all address child development and parenting skill development.

Intensive Child and Family Intervention

The Intensive Child and Family Intervention program provides children with severe behaviours with intensive, flexible mental health treatment services in their home, schools and/or communities through Child and Youth Worker services attached to a Child and Family Team.

Kids Share / Enfants Partage (OEYC Satellite)

Provides a wide range of activities for children, with a focus on the 0-6 populations. The program boasts an extensive inventory of books, tapes, videos, games, puppets and toys as a means to stimulate the early learning process. 675-2003 for program times and locations.

Supervised Access

The Supervised Access Program provides a safe, neutral and child focused setting for exchanges and/or visits between children and visiting parents, to decrease conflict and stress surrounding access to and/or exchange of children for separated/divorced families. The visits are monitored by trained staff. The parents do not have any contact with one another, but both parents must consent to the service being provided. While participants may use our Supervised Access voluntarily, these same services may be ordered by the courts in custody and access disputes. Whether court ordered or voluntary, the participants make the initial contact with the Supervised Access Coordinator at 566-5866 ex 4401.

An income assessment is completed at intake to determine the user fees to be levied. Subsidies are available for families who cannot afford to pay. The program operates out of the Jubilee Heritage Family Resources Center at 189 Applegrove Street in Sudbury, while the Supervised Access office is located at 176 Larch Street in Sudbury.

Youth Services- This program is for teens (12-18) with physical disabilities that have the potential to direct their own care. This program offers: personal support services, an enjoyable after school program and activities, independence training, access to computers, recreation, socialization and snack. Our campus allows youth to progress in a positive direction into adulthood and community living: collaboration between agencies; address transitions issues, provide skills necessary to direct their own care, acquiring the necessary skills to manage different responsibilities in the home, at school and in the community. There is a cost to their programs. ICAN also offers Respite Saturdays, Camp programs (summer and March break), a School holiday program, the Home alone program and You go girl. (*Funding assistance may be available*)

Independent Living Services- ICAN is a key provider of services for adults with physical disabilities who require Independence Training, Supportive Housing and Outreach Attendant Services. Individuals can access services beginning at 16 years of age. ICAN will support youth with physical disabilities who are transitioning to ICAN adult services.

<p>There are close to 100 Licensed Child Care programs in Greater Sudbury serving children 0-12 (and older with a special needs referral). Licensed child care programs provide early education and care in structured group programs. Starting in January 2008 families in Greater Sudbury will be able to search and register for all licensed child care programs through the On-line Centralized Registry and Waitlist for Child Care which will be available through the City's website at www.greatersudbury.ca/childcare. The City funds Child Care Resources (CCR) to support the inclusion of children with special needs into all licensed child care programs. Based on the child's needs CCR will provide consultation to the child care program and may approve funding for additional staffing to support the program to ensure successful inclusion. The special needs integration program is designed so that parents of children with special needs do not have to pay more than other families for licensed child care. Parents interested in licensed child care for a child with special needs should contact the Children's Community Network (CCN) at 566-3416.</p>

<p>CCAC is the access point to home health services, school health services and information about/referral to community support services. Based on an assessment, a Case Manager determines which services a person is eligible to receive. The services offered in home are nursing, personal support / homemaking, caregiver respite, physiotherapy, occupational therapy, speech therapy, dietetics, and social work. CCAC also administers the Enhanced Respite Program for medically fragile children. A parent can contact CCAC directly for services. Physician referrals also accepted and may be needed, depending on the reason for the referral (e.g. nursing).</p>

SPOT (Speech, Physio and Occupational Therapy Program)

A traveling team of CTC therapy professionals visit community child care settings and provide programming to facilitate each child's function and successful integration.

The CTC School Program

The Ministry of Education staffs two Section 23 classrooms within the Children's Treatment Centre where individualized academic instruction is provided to students who require and are benefiting from intensive rehabilitation therapy. Admission to the classroom is through an internal referral process.

A physician's referral (family physician, specialist or a paediatrician) is required for the services at the Children's Treatment Centre. Referrals go to the Children's Treatment Centre. Non urgent Intakes are done by the Children's Community Network.

Genetic counselling gives you current information and guidance about growth, developmental, learning and health problems that have a genetic cause. Genetic testing is available for some conditions. A diagnosis of a genetic condition may be made or confirmed in your family. Families learn about the diagnosis and what it means for the family members. Specialties include adult genetics, biochemical genetics, cancer genetics, paediatric genetics, general genetics and prenatal.

Infant Development provides early intervention for newborn children to age 5 who have a developmental delay or who are at risk for delayed development. There is no cost for the service to parents. Some of the services provided include: evaluating the child's development and family needs, setting goals and introducing activities to encourage the development of the child's physical, social and intellectual skills, supporting the family and providing guidance regarding child development and parenting skills and assisting the family in accessing community services. Services can be accessed by contacting the Children's Community Network at 566-3416.

Paediatric Clinics

Neonatal Follow-up Clinic

The Neonatal Follow-Up Clinic (NNFU) is dedicated to the well-being of high risk infants by providing medical and therapy screenings, at routine intervals, to infants who were born prematurely or who have other risk factors. The NNFU Clinic will see the baby at important times during their development. Appointments are arranged for 2 months, 6 months, 9 months, 12 months, 15 months, 18 months, and 24 months of age. (from your baby's due date or corrected age). The family meets with the CTC NNFU team that includes a paediatrician, a physiotherapist, an occupational therapist and a speech language pathologist.

Visiting Specialists Clinics

This program provides local access to a range of specialty physicians who would normally only be accessed through travel to distant facilities. Currently, the Montreal Shrine Hospital provides a Visiting Specialist Pediatric Orthopedic Surgeon who provides two-day clinics at the Children's Treatment Center and the Laurentian Site approximately 5 times per year. From the Hospital for Sick Children, Pediatric Rheumatologists and Cardiologists provide specialized rheumatology and cardiology clinics approximately three times a year at our Hospital. Referrals for these clinics can be made by local paediatricians

Cystic Fibrosis Clinic

The Northeastern Ontario Cystic Fibrosis Clinic sees children and families from all over northeastern Ontario who have been diagnosed with CF. Children visit the clinic every 3 months and meet with the multidisciplinary team comprised of a paediatrician, a physiotherapist, a dietician, the nurse coordinator and a social worker.

RSV Clinic

Premature babies, babies with chronic lung disease, and babies with moderate to severe congenital heart disease are among children at highest risk of severe RSV infection. Infants/children referred to the program receive the Synagis vaccine.

Sudbury Regional Hospital Clinics(cont'd)

Seating Clinic

The Seating Clinic offers comprehensive seating and mobility services to adults and children. These services are available to any person who resides in Northeastern Ontario and has complex seating and wheelchair needs. Routine wheelchair assessments are done by the out-patient Occupational Therapy service, or in the community through the Community Care Access Center, or by therapists in private practice. Services include: multi-disciplinary team assessments, consultations, prescription of seating and mobility devices, pressure mapping , fabrication and fitting of custom made seating systems, on-going follow-up.

Wordplay Preschool Language Program

Any preschool child 70 months (5 years 10 months) or younger who lives in the Sudbury/Manitoulin Districts is eligible for services.

We provide speech and language services to any preschooler 5 years or younger who lives in the Sudbury and Manitoulin Districts. These services are free and are available in English and French. Assessments, Parent/Caregiver Education Groups, Clinic and Community Consultations to parent(s)/agency, Home activities for your child, Individual or Group Programming and School Transition meetings. Services are provided at the clinic sites. Parents/Caregivers must attend all sessions.

Northeast Blind Low Vision Intervention Program

This program provides specialized family-centred services for children from birth to grade one entry who are blind or have low vision. This program offers family support, intervention and consultation services.

Northeast Infant Hearing Program

To identify children with a hearing loss (by 3 months of age) and provide communication programming. This program offers family support, intervention and consultation services.

The school also provides on site residential programs, academics, and specialized educational support for deafblind, low vision and blind students.

<p>The Assistance for Children with Severe Disabilities program helps parents with some of the extra costs of caring for a child who has a severe disability. A parent or a legal guardian whose child is under 18 years of age lives at home, and has a severe disability may be eligible to receive help under this program depending on the family's income. Extra expenses that could be covered include: travel, assistive devices (costs and repairs), parental relief, prescription drugs, dental services, eye glasses. How much a family receives depends on the family's income, the severity of the disability, the kind of difficulties the child has in activities of daily living and the extraordinary costs related to the disability.</p>

<p>Child Care Subsidy is a program of the City of Greater Sudbury which helps families by paying some or all of their child care costs for children up to 12 (or up to 18 if the child has special needs) using licensed or other approved child care programs. To qualify, both parents (or the lone parent) must be working or going to school during the hours when the child is in child care or a social, medical or special needs referral must be provided. Eligibility for child care subsidies is based on the family's previous year's taxable income. Families may phone 3-1-1 with their income tax information for an over-the-phone preassessment to see if they qualify. The City funds Child Care Resources (CCR) to support the inclusion of children with special needs into all licensed child care programs. Based on the child's needs CCR will</p>

The Government of Canada manages eligibility for the Disability Tax Credit. The Disability Tax Credit (DTC) is available to people who are blind or have a severe and prolonged mental or physical impairment, which causes them to be:

- markedly restricted in their ability to perform a basic activity of daily living (speaking, hearing, walking, feeding, dressing, elimination or mental functions necessary for everyday life) all or almost all of the time, even with therapy and the use of devices and medication or b.
- significantly restricted in their ability to perform two or more of the basic activities of daily living (see above) all or almost all of the time, even with therapy and the use of devices and medication.

The application is available on the website. Your physician or paediatrician needs to fill it out and sign it. Children who are eligible for the Disability Tax Credit receive a non-refundable tax credit which is transferable to a parent and are eligible for higher Canada Child Tax Benefits. These benefits may be available retroactively as far back as the onset of the disability, as stated by your doctor on the Disability Tax Credit Certificate (to a maximum of 10 years).
